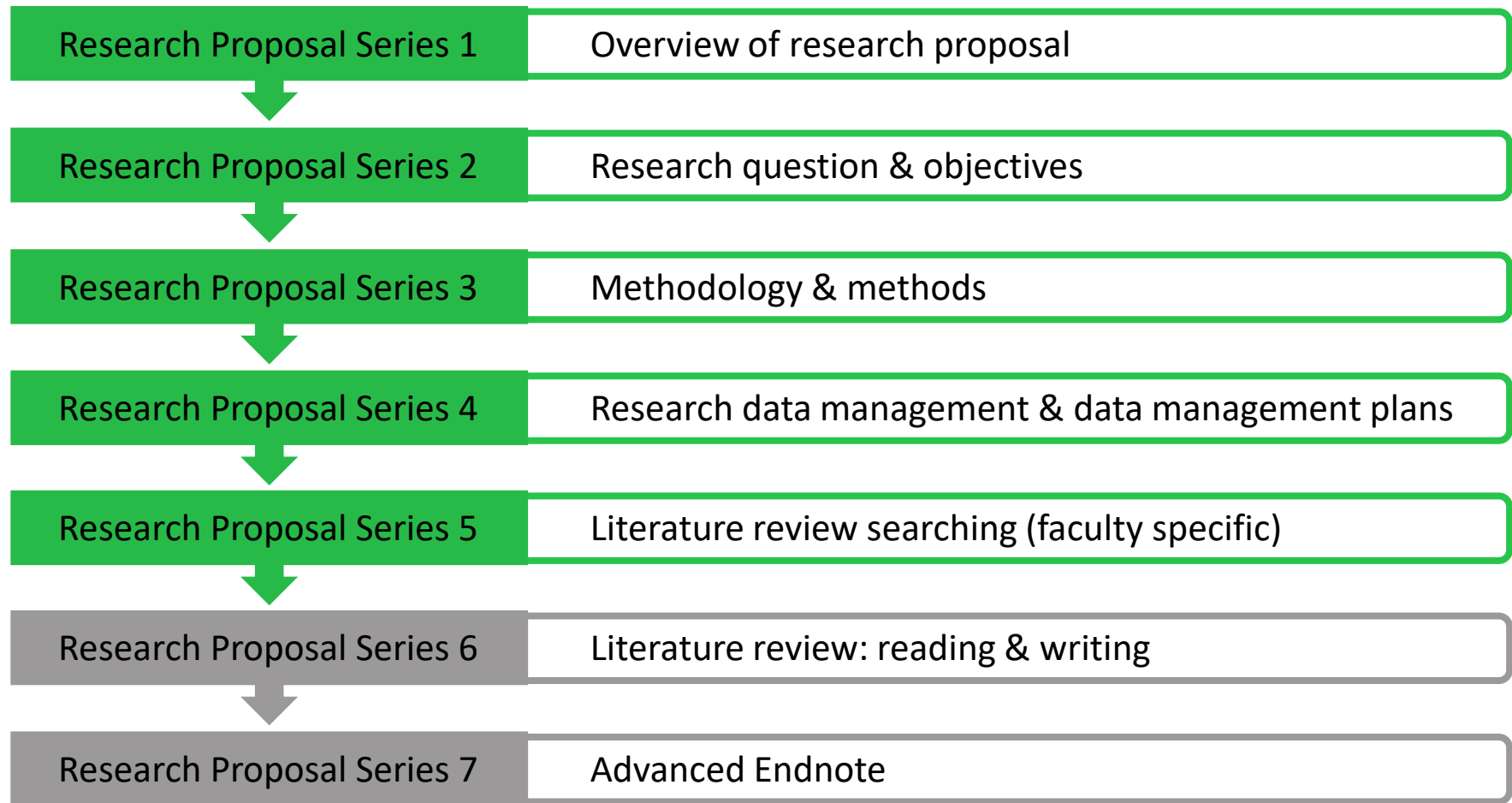

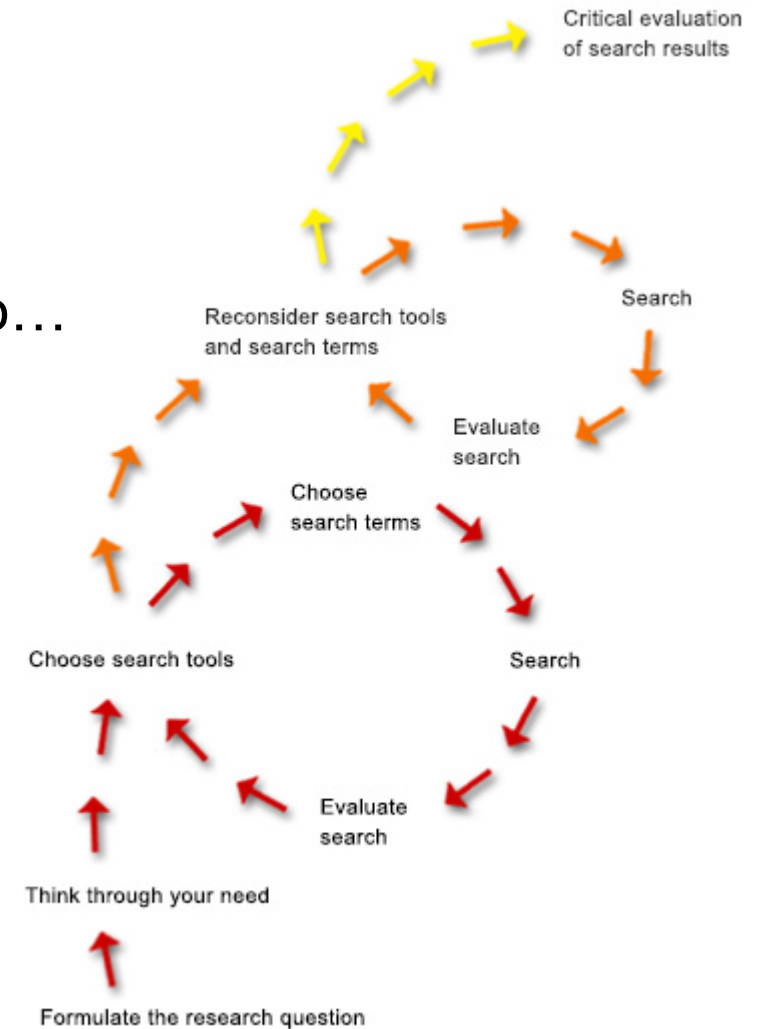

Plan your search with a clear strategy in mind:

- It begins with a robust research question
- Decide on what kind of literature review you will do...
 - Scoping review
 - Narrative or traditional
 - Systematic style literature review
- Decide on the type of information you need and where you can get this information
- Understand the search process and get the most out of your resources
- How will you manage your research results?



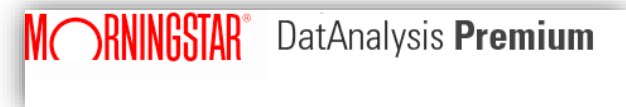
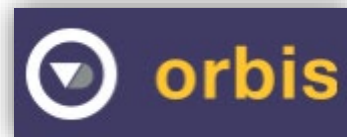
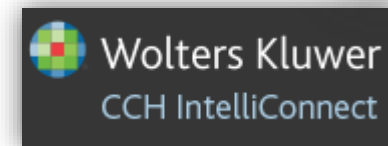
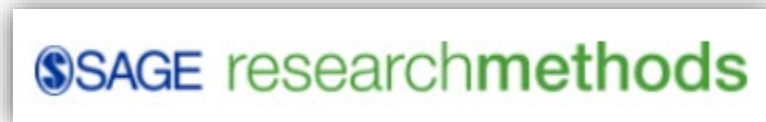

- Google's Advanced Search page replicates some of what you can do with the search bar but you don't need to know the syntax: https://www.google.com.au/advanced_search

Grey Literature....

- Grey literature refers to both published and unpublished research material that is not available commercially
- Most grey literature is free. However, some sources such as market research firms charge for access to their material.
- Look for associations, organisations, government departments etc.
- Google - consider restricting your search to the .org and/or .gov domains on the Internet (site:gov.au)

Literature Reviews or Review Articles

- [Proquest](#) – choose Review as the ‘Document Type’
- [Scopus](#) – choose Review as the ‘Document Type’
- [Annual Reviews](#) – provides critical reviews written by experts. Reviews will provide an overview of a particular subject often reviewing past research and focusing on current knowledge and avenues for future research.
- [Sage Research Methods online](#) – find resources to answer your research methods and statistics questions. This tool is designed to help create research projects and understand the methods behind them. Covers criminology, criminal justice, political science, international relations, public policy and sociology (amongst others)

The Research Question.....

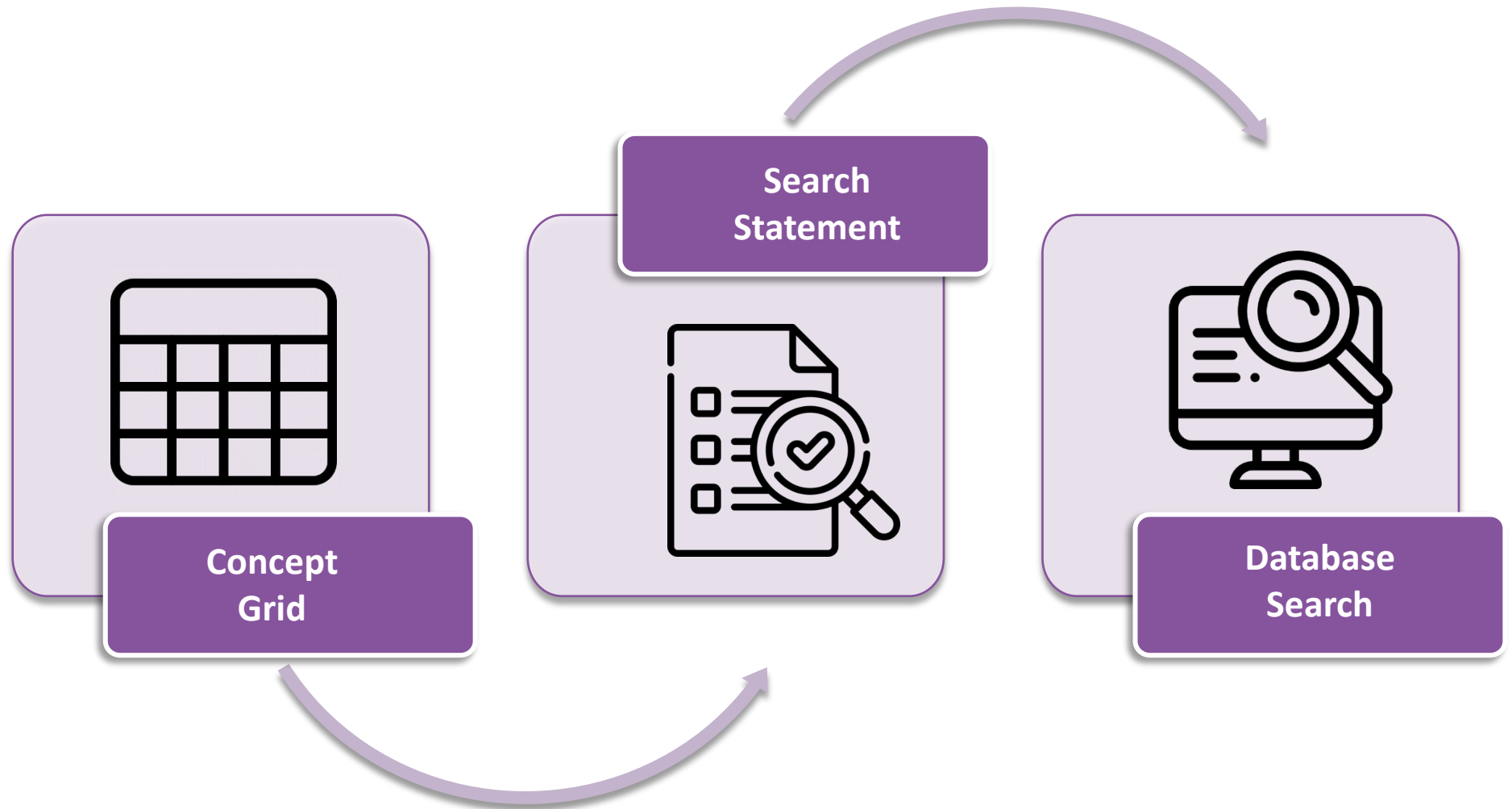
Identifying the research question **is** research

The research question may change over time

A good research question guides the research process:

- It informs the search strategy
- It also informs which resources to use
- Can be complex & consist of several sub-questions
- Must be able to be segmented into searchable components

Strategies for when it gets tricky...

Proximity Searches

Proximity searching is a way to search for two or more words that occur within a certain number of words from each other. The proximity operators are composed of a letter (N or W) and a number (to specify the number of words). The number cannot exceed 255.

The proximity operator is placed between the words that are to be searched, as follows:

- Near Operator (N): **N5** finds the words if they are a maximum of five words apart from one another, regardless of the order in which they appear. For example, type **tax N5 reform** to find results that have a maximum of five words between the beginning and ending terms, that would match **tax reform** as well as **tax that has been submitted for reform**.
- Within Operator (W): **W8** finds the words if they are within eight words of one another, in the order in which you entered them. For example, type **tax W8 reform** to find **Proximity operators - W/n, PRE/n** — match **tax reform** but would not match **reform of income tax**.

In addition, multiple terms can be used on either side of the operator. See the following examples:

- (tax OR tariff) N5 reform
- oil W3 (disaster OR clean-up OR contamination)
- (baseball OR football OR basketball) N5 (teams OR players)

You can choose between two **Proximity** operators to find words within a certain distance from each other: **Pre/n** specifies a word order whereas **W/n** does not.

Proximity operator	Example
W/n	Indicates distance between words, but not the order — e.g., <i>journal W/2 publishing</i> , where <i>journal</i> can be found within a distance of two words from <i>publishing</i>
Pre/n	Terms must appear in a specific order between words — e.g., <i>behavioral PRE/3 disturbances</i> , where <i>behavioral</i> precedes <i>disturbances</i> within three words

Strategies for when it gets tricky...

Nesting

A technique that allows you to organize complex search statements using more than one kind of search operator.

When nesting, you are combining Boolean Operators (AND, OR, NOT) with symbols such as parenthesis, quotation marks, and truncations.

Example:

Abstract

While employees' mental health is the focus of considerable attention from researchers, the public, and policymakers, leaders' mental health has almost escaped attention. We start by considering several reasons for this, followed by discussions of the effects of leaders' mental health on their own leadership behaviors, the emotional toll of high-quality leadership, and interventions to enhance leaders' mental health. We offer 8 possible directions for future research on leaders' mental health. Finally, we discuss methodological obstacles encountered when investigating leaders' mental health, and policy dilemmas raised by leaders' mental health. © 2016 American Psychological Association.

'Pearl growing' (also known as 'Citation mining' or 'Snowballing') is an effective approach to systematic literature searching which helps to ensure that **all** relevant literature has been identified.

All three names hint at the iterative process involved – a grain of sand in an oyster grows slowly, layer by layer, into a pearl – one citation is mined, by digging deeper into the reference list and then digging even deeper into the references cited by those references – or a snowball is grown into a larger snowball by adding more layers of snow

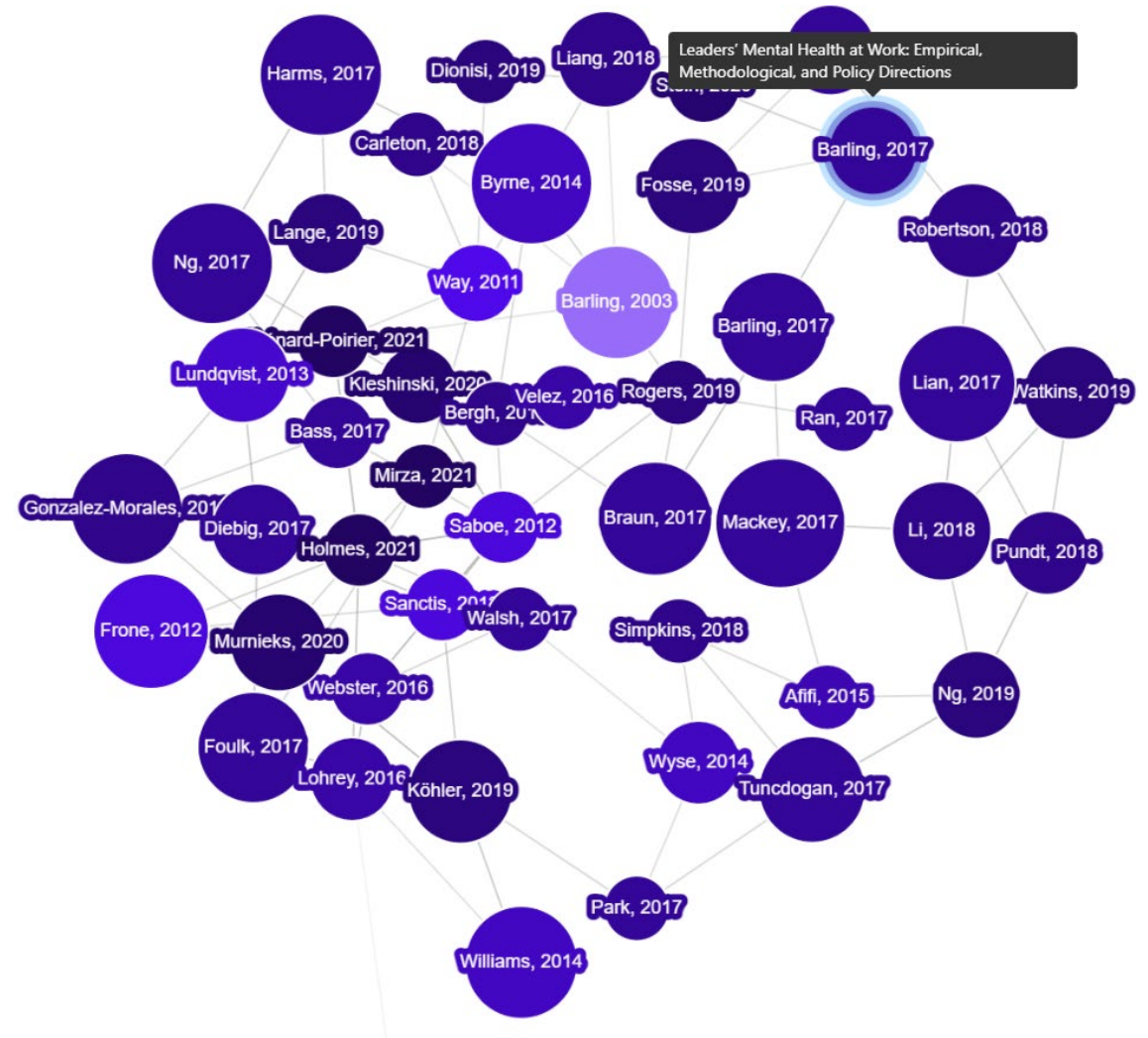

Managers are Less Burned-Out at the Top: the Roles of Sense of Power and Self-Efficacy at Different Hierarchy Levels

While managers generally seem to enjoy better mental health than regular employees, there are also plenty of reports about them suffering from burnout. The present study explores this relationship between hierarchy level and burnout in more detail. In doing so, we not only investigate what impact managerial rank may have on burnout, but we also contrast two different theoretically meaningful mediators for the relationship: sense of power (feeling in control over people) and work-related self-efficacy (feeling in control overtasks). The results of two surveys—the first with 580 managers (single-source) and the second with 154 managers matched with ratings from close others (multi-source)—show a negative relationship between managers' hierarchy level and burnout that is explained by both mediators independently. Additional analyses reveal that high sense of power and high self-efficacy are both necessary conditions for low levels of burnout. Such fine-grained analyses allow us to understand why managers at the top are less threatened by burnout, in contrast to what some media reports suggest.

Managing your search results

Record your search strategy

- Save it on the database you are searching
- Keep a record – paper, Word document, Excel spreadsheet
- GradCoach: offer a free Excel spreadsheet template to organise your readings, keywords, authors, leads etc

Managing your search results

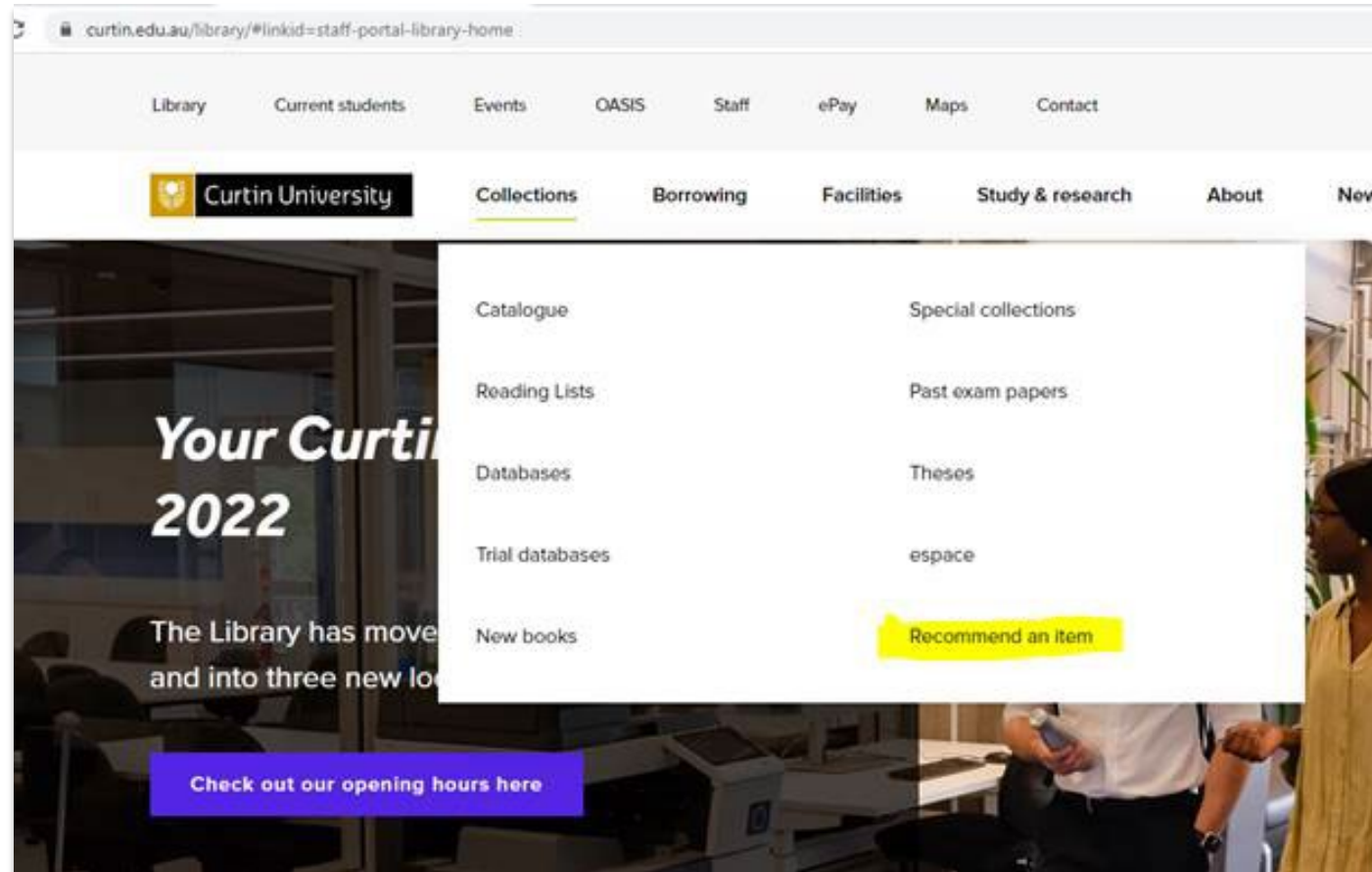
- Export from databases to EndNote

- Organise your material in a matrix
